A TRIBUTE TO Our Joey

In August 2001 Council accepted

an offer from Honda to commission a

life size bronze sculpture of Joey on his famous Honda SP1 Bike. The sculpture, funded by Honda and Council, was designed and produced by Isle of Man sculptress Amanda McMillan.

The casting of the bike and the pose, which shows Joey with one foot on the ground and slightly looking over his left shoulder, was taken from a picture specially chosen by Joey's wife Linda.

The sculpture was installed in a memorial garden created by the Council on lands at Seymour Street in the town, donated by the N I Housing Executive. The attractively laid out garden has pedestrian links to Seymour Street and Castle Street. The central feature is a wall displaying plaques of Joey's achievements.

"The sculpture is a fitting lasting tribute to Joey, who, unaffected by the world success which his motorcycling career brought him, remained the quiet, cheerful, family man from Ballymoney, a characteristic which endeared him to all." Ballymoney Mayor, Councillor Bill Kennedy, on accepting the sculpture of Joey from Honda on 23rd April 2002.

The plaque at the site reads:

Joey Dunlop - 1952-2000 Husband, Father, Son, Brother, Friend and Gentleman, who became one of motorcycling racing's greatest ambassadors

An exact copy of Ballymoney's tribute was unveiled on June 4th 2002 on a part of the

T.T. course known as "The Mountain", opposite a motorcycle museum. That venture was sponsored by Aria Helmets which Joey wore during his racing career.



Joey's CAREER AND ACHIEVEMENTS


Joey EARNS THE FREEDOM OF BALLYMONEY BOROUGH

In a career that brought him success on the motorcycling world's outstanding circuits, Joey Dunlop remained the quiet, cheerful, unaffected man from Ballymoney. He made no boasts, issued no threats, avoided the headlines and concentrated on getting on with the job. Joey, *'The King of the Roads'*, through courage and ambition, became the greatest rider of all time.





In addition to winning five Formula One World Championships, he made sporting history by setting a new world record of 26 wins in the Isle of Man T.T. Races. His sporting achievements were recognised by Her Majesty the Queen when he was awarded an MBE in 1986. Ten years later, he was presented with an OBE for his remarkable humanitarian work with children in Eastern Europe. "That the Freedom of the Borough of Ballymoney be conferred on Mr Joey Dunlop in recognition of the great honour brought to the Borough through the outstanding skill and courage by which he gained, as a racing motor cyclist of world renown, five Formula One Championships, and a record of fifteen wins in the Isle of Man T.T. races." Joey also received an accolade 'knight' of the Isle of man. Isle of

Tragic loss of a gifted sportsman

Joey Dunlop lost his life on Sunday, 2 July 2000, while racing in Estonia. It is estimated that 60,000 people from across the world came to Ballymoney to attend his funeral.

has followed Joey's glittering career with tremendous pride and satisfaction, in particular his recent string of successes at the Isle of Man T.T. Joey was a brilliant sportsman, a true man of the people and a wonderful ambassador for Northern Ireland. It will be hard to find his like again."
